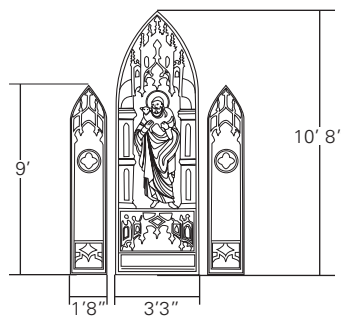


STAINED GLASS WINDOW TRIPTYCH

(FROM SAINT ANN'S EPISCOPAL CHURCH; BROOKLYN, NY)

These three stained glass windows were salvaged from and originally installed in St. Ann's Episcopal Church located on Clinton Street in Brooklyn, NY. These windows were installed amongst the very first figurative stained-glass windows in the United States. Many such windows were installed as early as 1849. These windows however are later and probably date closer to the turn of the century. Part of the Neo-Gothic revival in the United States, these pieces exemplify the style used to compliment the design elements found throughout Neo-Gothic and Gothic architecture. This was the preferred church style in the United States from the late 1840's until the War Between the States. The stained glass trade gained popularity during this period. Like the Classical, the Gothic style never disappears, but re-emerges in popularity from time to time. The early twentieth century was a very rich period for the American Gothic stained glass. This piece, titled "The Gothic Shepherd", aptly named for the Christ figure carrying a sheep, is comprised of three separate panels. These decorative, leaded windows have been restored, and structurally reinforced by the skilled artisans in our workshop. This delicate treasure has been sandwiched between two panes of glass and housed in a steel frame. The resulting effect is the preservation of a lasting work of art, ready for display or installation in any location. Each metal frame is 1 1/2" thick.
